

The General Assembly of this Province are to meet here on Tuesday the 21st of November Instant; Circular Letters having been wrote to the respective Members, requiring their Attendance on that Day.

Capt. Elder, in 7 Weeks from Madeira, spoke with the following Vessels, viz. The 11th ult. in Lat. 26, 43, Lon. 61, with the Snow Penna, Capt. Haskies, from Madeira for Philadelphia, who some Time before, fell in with a Brig from the Straights belonging to Liverpool, Wilson, Master, bound for Philadelphia; the 16th, Lat. 29, 41, Lon. 66, 45, with the Brig Resolution, Captain Dickenson, from Maryland, for Antigua; on the 19th, Lat. 30, 51, Lon. 69, with a small new Sloop from Virginia, for Jamaica; and a few Days after, in Lat. 36, 30, on the Edge of Soundings, he fell in with the Brig James, from Philadelphia, for St. Croix, all well.

His Majesty's Ship the Fowey, Capt. Robinsohn, from Halifax for South-Carolina, loughed at Sandy-Hook last Week: A few Days before he made the Land, he spoke with a Snow from London, for this Port, 12 Weeks out, much in Want of Necessaries, with which he supplied them.

Monday last his Majesty's Ship the Deal Castle, Capt. Jacobs, arrived here from Boston.

We hear from Wichester, that at the Fair held there last Week, a Man from the Jerseys, drank in two Hours, 17 Quarts of Cyder, and two Quarts of Rum, and to keep it down, eat only 100 Loaves.

About half past Eight last Friday Night, the Sugar House of Mr. John Corlandt, in this City, took Fire, and to be occasioned by a Boy firing a Pistol into one of the Windows, by which Accident, about 12,000 lbs. of Loaf Sugar was entirely destroyed, the very little Damage done to the Sugar House, the Fire being soon extinguished, owing to the usual Alacrity of the Inhabitants on such Occasions.

The Pensacola Packet, Capt. Offat, sailed last Saturday for New-Providence, in which Vessel went Passenger, Capt. JOHN MONTANSON, English.

The 29th ult. after a lingering Illness, at his House in this City, died Col. MICHAEL TRUDY, a Gentleman who sustains a good Character, and was well respected by all his Acquaintance. He had been for many Years a Military Officer, of approved Conduct, in the Service of this Government, and was present in most of the Campaigns in America, during the last War. On Tuesday last his Remains were decently interred in Trinity Church Yard. His Funeral was attended by a large Number of respectable Inhabitants, and being a Free Mason, a numerous Procession of the Friendly Brothers, with their Badges, preceded the Corps, to the Grave.
