

upon the Deck. In the Scuffle, which began immediately after Johnson and Birch entered the Cabin, the Captain was soon assailed by a Gentleman Passenger, who lay in the Mate's Bed, by which Help the two Murderers were at once conveyed on deck and secured. The Mate, who was the Captain's purser, was looking on from the Boats, with a Supply of Herculit and Water, a Compass and two Oars. After they were on board the Boat, he likewise obliged another of the Men (John Crab) to accompany them. The Captain discovered that this Man knew of the Sward's having been taken from the Cabin and brought upon Deck, and from that and several other Circumstances, had Reason to conclude he was privy to the whole Conspiracy.

The Weather proved favourable for many Days afterwards, so that it is probable the People have been taken up by some Vessel, or got to Madeira, except Johnson, who was thought to be mortally wounded.

There was no other Reason to suspect Denry (the Man at Helm when the Murder was committed) as he was concerned in the Plot; but only that he did not think to inform the Captain, gave him no Assistance, nor could give a satisfactory Account of his Conduct, when he was taxed with it. He seemed continually troubled and uneasy, had in a few Days after was taken ill and died the same Day; so that there is now no Witness of the Murder. There was then only the Captain the Passenger and a Boy to navigate the Vessel, but on the 27th January, Lat. 31 N, Long. 45 W, spoke the Ship St. Domingo; Capt. Stevenson of Liverpool, bound to Cape Fear; (all well) who supplied them with a Hand. And on the 10th Instant spoke the Steamer Capt. Lightburn, of this Port; 55 Leagues distant, all well.

On Monday Morning between three and four o'clock, a Fire was discovered breaking out at the Store of Mr. Beverly Robinson, almost adjoining to the Kitchens belonging to the Post-Office in Stone-Street. The Fire got to a considerable Height before it was discovered, which is generally imputed to the neglect of Mr. Kitchin, who is it is well known found fast asleep; however it is certain that the People were remarkably slow in assembling, and that the Flames were almost at full Height before a Bell began to ring. A great Number of adjacent Houses took Fire before any Precautions were taken for their Extinction. It is not without Danger of the Destruction of almost the whole Quarter of the Town, but at last a sufficient Number assembled and effected themselves to effectually that the Flames were suppressed and extinguished. The House where the Fire began was entirely consumed, together with Mr. Kitchin's and the Goods of several other Houses were much damaged. A considerable Number of the Officers of the Army, and Soldiers assembled, and were singularly silent, not only in suppressing the Flames, but in generously aiding in the Property of the Persons whose Houses were damaged.
